




Every individual I interviewed gave me an opportunity to hear a fresh perspective.

Personal Reflection

During my time interning with Kennedy Krieger, I have learned and grown professionally in ways that I wouldn't have been able to with just my college education. An internship is an opportunity to try new things and surprise yourself. Experiencing new opportunities helped me challenge myself. Even if I had no clue on how to do a certain project, I would still take it on. It was the perfect time for me to learn and grow. I also learned to never be afraid to ask questions or for help. At the beginning, I didn't know how to do many things. But, as an overthinker, I was always concerned about being annoying or bothersome.
