Who We Are

The Specialized Transition Program (STP) at Kennedy Krieger Institute is a comprehensive neurorehabilitation day hospital designed to treat children who are not in need of hospitalization but still require intensive, coordinated therapeutic care.

In the STP, patients receive a full range of physical and cognitive rehabilitation services for neurological and orthopedic conditions as well as educational programming—a natural environment for children. Our goal is for each patient to successfully transition back to their school, home and community life.

We treat patients year-round, five days a week, during regular school hours. The average length of admission for our patients is 31 days, with some needing more or less time depending on the rehabilitation goals they develop with their family and therapeutic care team members.

The STP is one of Kennedy Krieger's Fairmount Rehabilitation Programs, an array of interdisciplinary therapy programs for patients with disorders and diseases of the nervous system.

Who We Serve

Our patients range in age from 2 to 23 years old, with an average age of 9 years. Collectively, they come to us with a variety of diagnoses, including:

- Traumatic brain injury
- Acquired central nervous system injury
- Spinal cord dysfunction
- Persistent pain or other health symptoms
- Developmental disabilities

We also serve patients with rehabilitation needs following orthopedic procedures, with a particular focus on individuals with developmental disabilities.

We provide our patients and their families with:


- Intensive rehabilitative therapy targeting the full spectrum of daily life—from mobility to life skills

Our Treatment Approach

Each patient receives an individualized rehabilitation plan tailored specifically to their needs and developed under the direction of our pediatric rehabilitation providers. During rehabilitation, patients may spend up to four hours a day in therapy addressing physical, communication, cognitive, medical, equipment and daily living goals.
